

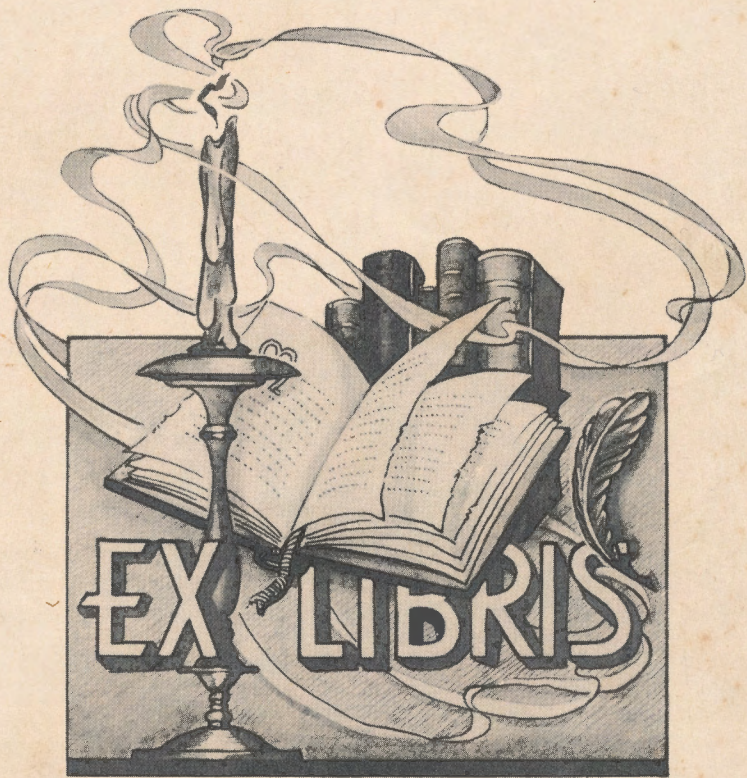

Attended Oakland City College two years. License for teaching includes Elementary Grades. She has taught twelve years, and is from Lynnville, Rural Route.

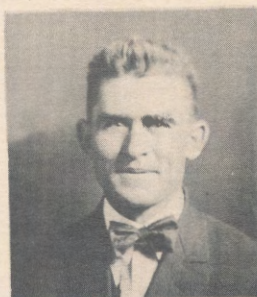

On September 6, 1943, 29 "green" Freshman appeared in the halls of L. H. S.. They were: Ruth Breckwinkle, Rosemary Wood, Rosa Gwaltney, Evelyn Schmidt, David Robinson, Thelma Dimmett, Lillian Rae Feidler, Byron Madden, Joan Barclay, Diana Gentry, Ray Meinert, June Holder, Charles Williams, Russell Bailey, George Osha, Hershell Lamping, Allen Lee Madden, Garland Evans, Helen Miles, Davey Arendell, Betty Perigo, Charlotte Stephens, Bob Christmas, Carl Perigo, Jack Shoulders, Lorene Bass, Ray Milton, and Bill Murphy. We enjoyed having Mr. Cato as our sponsor. Class officers for the year were: President, Evelyn Schmidt; Vice President, David Robinson; Secretary, Russell Bailey; Treasurer, Joan Barclay; Those quitting during the year were: Charles Williams, and Ray Milton. Bill Murphy left us to enter at Spurgeon. We held two class parties during the year. After eight hard months of studying we were glad to see the summer vacation come.

The following fall of 1944, we came back to enroll as sophomores. The first week of school we met with our sponsor Mrs. Bayer and elected the following class officers: President, Russell Bailey; Vice President, Garland Evans; Secretary, June Holder; Treasurer, Allen Madden; Joe Jones came from Central High School of Evansville to join our class. Joan Barclay left us to enter school at Boonville. Others leaving during the years were: Thelma Dimmett, George Osha, Hershell Lamping, Garland Evans, Carl Perigo, Jack Shoulders, and Beatrice Bass. In Geometry class we organized a club called "Bayers Headache Club." In English we had an "English Dramatics Club," under the supervision of Mr. Gentry. During the year Betty Perigo was elected cheer-leader, a position which she held for three years. We had now completed half of our high school career, and were ready to start our Junior year.

In our Junior year, 1945-46 our class officers were: President, Russell Bailey; Vice President, David Robinson; Secretary, Ray Meinert; Treasurer, Byron Madden; Mr. Gentry was our sponsor. Our class increased in number with the addition of Betty Miller from Boonville, Gene Emmons from Spurgeon, and Bill Murphy from Reitz of Evansville. Those leaving during the year were: Rosemary Wood, June Holder, and Lorene Bass. The first semester we gave the Junior play entitled "Her Emergency Husband." We took the Seniors on a trip to Spring Mill State Park, the Park is scenic as well as historical.

When we returned the next fall we realized that we were entering our last lap of high school and we were determined to make it a good year. 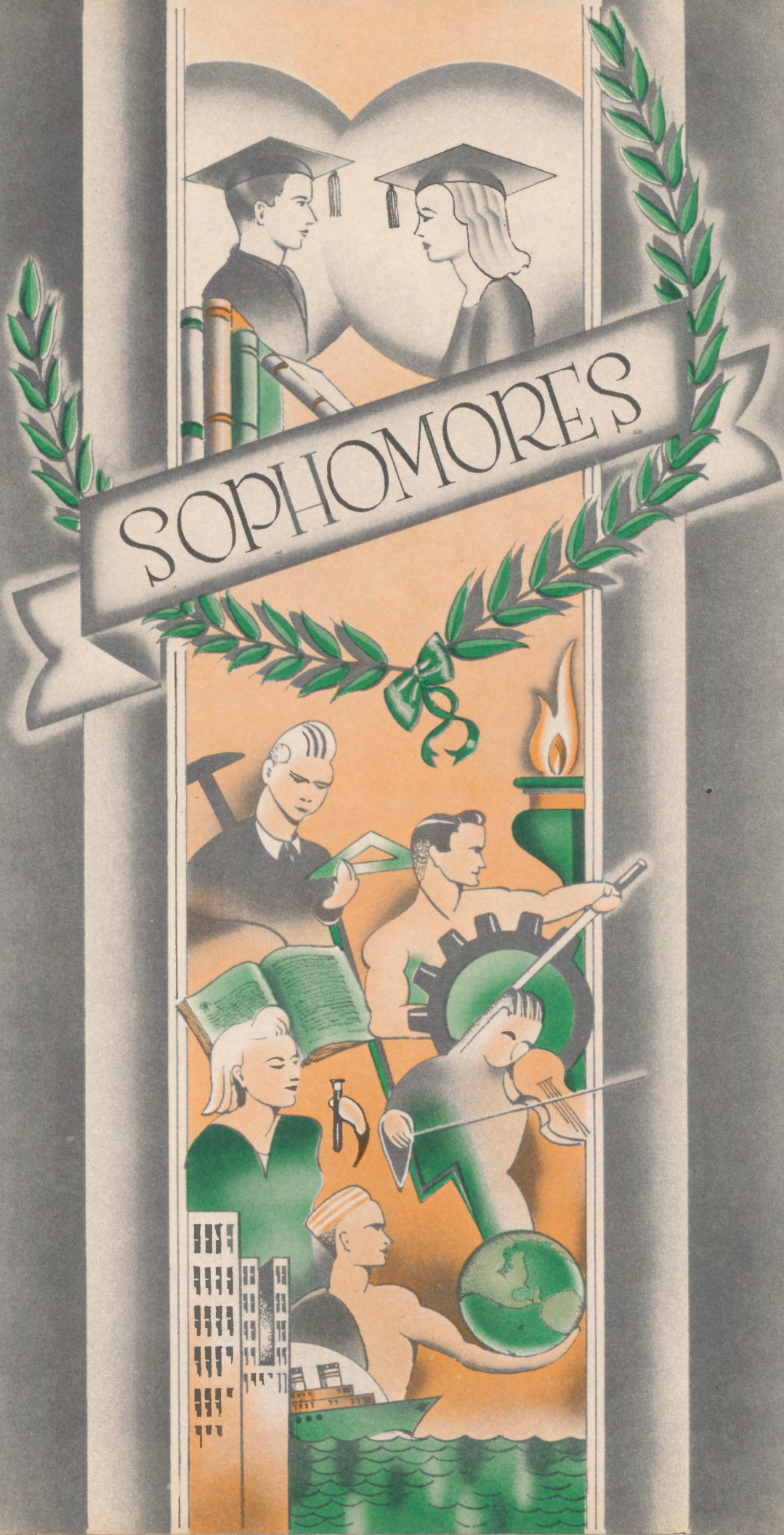

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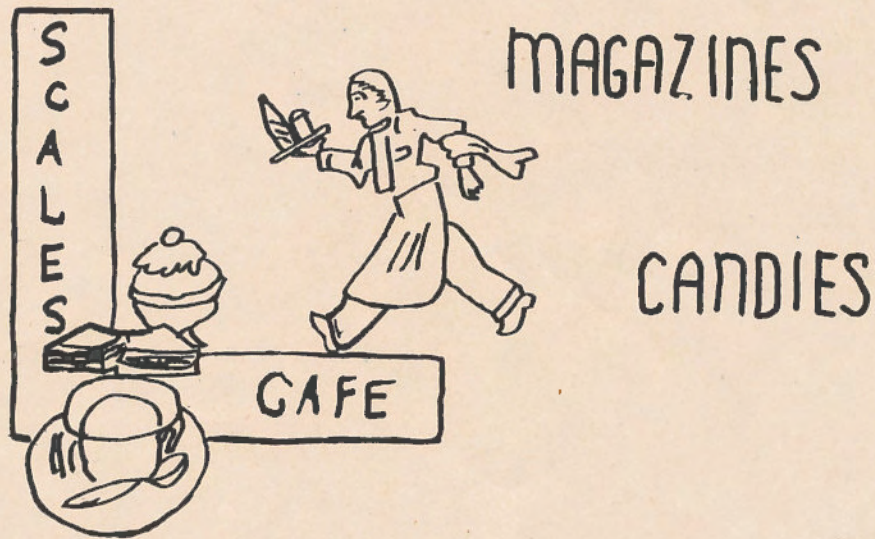
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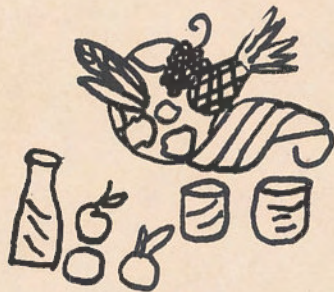
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
